## Sports Summit Examines Solutions for Youth Violence

As a priest, **Fr. Scott** stood out on Wednesday among a lineup of Chicago sports celebrities that included Bulls “Threepeat” champion Horace Grant, former Blackhawks forward Jamal Mayers, White Sox shortstop

Tim Anderson, and former NFL-running back and current WGN sports commentator Jarrett Payton. But his opening reflections helped set the tone for the panel’s discussion on the issue of youth violence.

“I was thinking on the way over that it’s no coincidence that we gather together today on the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi,” Fr. Scott began, noting how St. Francis had invited each of us to be instruments of God’s peace. Accordingly, the solution to violence “has to begin with us,” Fr. Scott said, through our mentorship of young people and our relationships and partnerships.

The panel on youth violence was part of the 2nd annual Chicago Sports Summit, a half-day conference that brings together sports icons and community leaders to discuss how athletics and after-school activities engage youth in positive behavior.



In exploring some of the root causes behind the issue, Fr. Scott looked to the effects of trauma on young people growing up exposed to violence. He noted how many of the young people who seek help at Mercy Home have lost loved ones or friends to violence and have experienced other traumas, like abuse and neglect. He described how trauma impacts adolescent brain development and how

traumatized youth respond to challenges or confrontations.

“They react.” Fr. Scott said. “And they do so in one of three ways. They’ll freeze in the moment. They’ll flee. Or, they’ll fight. And what we are seeing is fighting. Reactive behavior.”

Fr. Scott stressed the role that trust plays in both the causes of and solutions to youth violence. So many young people have had their trust broken by

adults, which has ramifications on a child's relationships with others and with the world around them. On other side of trust, when we provide children with a safe environment with reliable adults who are consistent and supportive in their interactions, you can witness the change that occurs in the child's outlook. "Bringing healing through trust is terribly important," Fr. Scott said.


Fr. Scott also urged the audience members to mentor youth to help restore that critical trust, including through volunteer programs like Friends First at Mercy Home.

In addition to their athletic achievements, every panelist was actively involved in philanthropic activity and empowering young people. Payton, who is the son of legendary Bears running back Walter Payton, for example, runs a foundation with his wife Trisha that creates programs to help children and adolescents develop leadership skills. Mayers serves as a community liaison with the Chicago Blackhawks, through which he operates the Get Out And Learn (GOAL) program that introduces hockey to underprivileged youth in local Chicago neighborhoods. He visited Mercy Home with the program in the past. Grant is a special advisor to Bulls President & COO Michael Reinsdorf, and represents the NBA both internationally and at local community events for the team.

Anderson was joined on stage by his wife Bria, who told the crowd how they dealt with their grief after losing a friend through gun violence just last May. The Anderson's created a mentorship program in partnership with Youth Guidance's Becoming a Man that is focused on youth violence prevention.

The panel was moderated by Chicago Tribune sports columnist David Haugh.

## Mercy Home Bands Together for Hurricane Relief

In the wake of Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, Rita, and Maria, Mercy Home for Boys & Girls is united in our efforts to provide relief, goods, and services for regions affected by these devastating storms. **Fr. Scott** has outlined a three-pronged plan of action that incorporates prayer, education, and philanthropy to promote an impactful, humanitarian response in the spirit of our agency's legacy of helping those in crisis.

Spiritual Development Director **Marc Velasquez**, is spearheading Mercy Home's prayer response with a range of conscientious reflection. Two prayer vigils for coworkers and youth are scheduled for the coming weeks: Walsh

Campus on October 13, and Hay Campus on October 15. As well, relief-effort themes such as “Gratitude opens the door for generosity” will be integrated into upcoming Thanksgiving celebrations. Down the road, hurricane-ravaged areas have been identified as potential destinations for future service trips for our boys and girls.

Senior Coordinator of the Learning Center and Tutoring, **Jessica McCarthy Kelleher**, kick-started Mercy Home’s education initiatives by plastering the walls of the Hay Campus Learning Center with posters about hurricanes and climate change, as well as photos of the storms’ destruction. Moving forward, the plan is to add information about the long-term impact of natural disasters in ways that are palatable for youth.

In the coming weeks, expect to see installations in the Hay cafeteria and at the Walsh Campus that help visualize and conceptualize the magnitude of these hurricanes. We intend these installations to be outright conversation starters and reference points for both coworkers and youth that hopefully lead to direct action.

In a true testament to our kids’ and coworkers’ initiative to take immediate action in the aftermath of tragedy, relief efforts have spontaneously taken off around Mercy Home.

Girls from our Walsh Campus led the charge with a near instantaneous response. Using portions of their allowances, young woman from Walgreen Home bought cases of water, while girls in Bernardin Home collected toiletries and clothing. All items were dropped off at the 22<sup>nd</sup> District Police Station for pick up by the Salvation Army.

More recent youth-led efforts have sprouted up around the Hay Campus. Sheil Home resident **Maurice** applied his culinary skills to organize and implement weekly bake sales, featuring brownies and cake, outside the cafeteria. His first bake sale for Houston victims raised \$134.92. Yesterday’s bake sale for Puerto Rico raised a whopping \$301.50. Maurice has even expanded his scope of assistance to include victims of the earthquakes in Mexico and the mass-shooting tragedy in Las Vegas. Upcoming bakes sales in honor of the following regions include: Mexico on October 11, Tampa on October 18, Miami on October 25, Barbuda on November 1, and Las Vegas on November 8.

Manager of Youth Care Operations, **Mario Tamayo**, facilitated efforts to seek local non-profit organizations and churches interested in accepting and transporting Mercy Home’s surplus of blankets and bed sheets. Members at Vida Abundante Church and Corazon Community Services, both located in Cicero, are slated to pick up a few pallets of extra bedding this week for disaster victims in Puerto Rico and Mexico.

Thank you to all our Mercy Home coworkers and kids who have taken the lead on our hurricane relief efforts.

Mercy Home’s enduring legacy of helping those in need is made possible by our charitable donors. But now it’s time to flip the script and give back.

Together, we can show world that true generosity and compassion is reciprocal. In the coming weeks, stay tuned for more coordinated efforts and ways to donate.

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## Seen Around the Home






